# Walker Kimball '85 Receives Special Edition of The Songs of Lambda Iota

In 2001, when **Woody Widlund '64** commissioned a new edition of The Songs of AI (the Society's third, preceded by print runs in 1909 and 1955), our song book was updated to include both the songs (lyrics and sheet music), as well as historical context for the ceremonial tunes. Woody, in his infinite wisdom, also commissioned four different versions of the book: a spiral bound edition for Chapter Room use and three presentation editions awarded to Owls, as merited by their level of financial contribution. A hard-bound copy is on offer in exchange for a \$130 donation, a leather-bound edition at \$1,300, and a finely tooled, leather-bound edition in wooden presentation case that is reserved for donors of \$13,000 or more.

At this year's meeting, **Spencer Baker '64** presented **Walker S. Kimball III '85** with our most ornately adorned song book for his incredibly wise contribution to society in the amount of \$13,013.13. The Board of Governors thanks Walker for his longstanding commitment to our efforts, and his most recent contributions of time in an advisory capacity to the BoG.

## Our Annual Meeting is Moving! Next Event to be held April 12, 2025

Based on feedback garnered from alumni and active members of our Society, it has come to the attention of the Board of Governors that the Society's current arrangement of hosting our annual meeting in conjunction with "UVM Weekend" has become untenable. Not only is it cost prohibitive for many of our alumni, but it is also difficult to predict, because the UVM alumni association is inconsistent from year to year in announcing the dates for UVM Weekend

To make our meetings as hospitable to attendance as possible, **Joel Sodano** '01 presented the following proposal to the brotherhood at the annual meeting: Effective January 1, 2025, our meetings be held each year on the Saturday closest to April 21, the anniversary date of our Society's founding. On occasions where the Saturday closest to April 21 coincides with Easter weekend, the meeting shall be held one week earlier.

The proposal passed with unanimous support, and 2025 annual meeting will be held on April 12, to avoid conflict with Easter.

#### Condition of the Society

Since suspension from Greek Life at UVM in 2007 (Spencer Baker)

**Occupancy** - ranged from zero in 2007, slowly increasing over the years to full occupancy of 24 for the current school year, plus fees from non-resident brothers

**Membership** - from 2007 until February 2023, we had no undergraduate members. Since February 2023, we have initiated more than 70 new brothers and are adding at least 25 per year through our partnership with Pi Kappa Phi. The history and traditions of our Society are included in the pledge education program that Pi Kappa Phi conducts.

**DEBT** - existing and accumulated from complete building renovation, chimney rebuilding, settlement with the U S Attorney and legal costs:

**Total:** \$2,331,000 **Debt retired:** -\$710,000

Current balance of first & second mortgages: \$1,621,000

**Resolution to be Debt Free by 2036** (Spencer Baker) At our 188th annual meeting September 28, 2024, our members approved the following Resolution:

The saga of The Lambda lota Society of the University of Vermont (hereinafter the Society) commenced on April 21, 1836, and; A grand home, now known as the Nest, was constructed at 440 Pearl Street, Burlington, Vermont, through the efforts of alumni and presented to the Society on June 25, 1913.

#### **BE RESOLVED:**

That we consider it the right, duty, and privilege of all living alumni, undergraduate, and future members of the Society to continue to improve and solidify the financial foundation of the Society; maintain the archives and traditions of the Society; continue to maintain and beautify our home as an asset for the Society and community; continue to add to the active and alumni membership of the Society and pass on its traditions through partnership with Pi Kappa Phi

#### TO THAT END:

With the approval of our membership attending our 188th annual meeting on September 28, 2024, or otherwise expressing their opinions, we are establishing a Financial Committee that will conduct a campaign to raise significant funds by our 190th anniversary on April 21, 2026, that will enable us to be debt free by our Bicentennial on April 21, 2036.
